SUBJECT: BEDH - Public Participation in Meetings.

BACKGROUND: The current policy BEDH provides that public participation at a board meeting shall last no more than 30 minutes and that each speaker will be afforded two minutes. The policy does not provide for situations in which there are more than 15 speakers or for other reasons the public comment could not be completed in 30 minutes.

DISCUSSION: The proposed revision provides that where there are so many speakers signed up that allowing each two minutes would cause public participation to exceed 30 minutes in length, the time will be divided equally among those signed up to speak. It also provides that each speaker will be afforded a minimum of 30 seconds in which to speak. In the event that still causes public participation to exceed 30 minutes, the time for public participation will be extended accordingly.

The author has also taken the liberty of substituting the word "comment" for "input" as a more appropriate term.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AT MEETINGS

Code BEDH Issued 8/08

Purpose: To establish the basic structure for public participation in board meetings.

Board meetings shall be conducted in an orderly and efficient manner. Reasonable controls shall regulate public presentations to the board.

Any individual who desires to appear before a regular meeting of the board shall sign in prior to the 5:15 p.m. open session and will be allowed a maximum of two minutes to address the board. A maximum of 30 minutes shall be provided for public comment to the board. If the list of those signed up to speak exceeds 15 names, the 30-minute period will be divided equally among those speakers. Each speaker shall be allowed a minimum of 30 seconds. In the event that all speakers cannot each be afforded 30 seconds within the 30-minute period, the period shall be extended to ensure that all speakers are permitted a minimum of 30 seconds. input to the board.

A suitable visible timing device shall be employed and it shall audibly mark the end of the two minute presentation period.

An individual or group may appear before the board only once on the same item within a sixmonth period unless special permission is granted by the board. No speaker may use the public commentinput session for personal or derogatory comment of any individual, to discuss personnel matters or to discuss matters otherwise private or confidential. Speakers are to discuss issues, not individuals. The chairman or his/her designee is authorized to terminate any speaker's time who does not conform to the focus on issues.

SUBJECT:

Organizational, Operational Efficiencies and Cost Controls

BACKGROUND:

In 2008, the Charleston County School District Board of Trustees in passing the budget also included in the resolution direction to staff of the District to define, create and execute upon a sustainable financial strategy for the District. The model of sustainability includes ongoing seeking of cost controls, operational efficiencies, and opportunities wherein to provide a greater return on investment for the minimum of financial requirements. In so doing, an element of cost efficiencies identified and executed at that time was called redesign. This was an exhaustive and date driven assessment of the business model/organization of schools. This resulted in the closing/repurposing of five (5) schools at that time. This is one of what can be multiple, significant analyses of the School District organization and operational structures.

DISCUSSION:

Inasmuch as the District utilizes an Audit & Finance Committee to review all significant financial related issues, as Acting Superintendent, I believe that it is appropriate and necessary to establish a Task Force that would be focused on operational efficiencies, effectiveness and cost controls. I envision this Task Force to be created and chartered in much the same as our Citizens Oversight Steering Committee is currently chartered. Although this may have short-term benefit, the intention is a long-term focus. Therefore, I am suggesting that the term of this Task Force for membership purposes be one year with renewal each successive year. This carries with it the expectation that the Task Force would continue its work in an ongoing fashion working directly with certain areas of District staff such as Human Resources, Finance and Academics.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Charleston County School District Board of Trustees hereby approves the establishment of a Task Force for cost control and operational efficiencies.

Note: The structure for the Task Force is found on the attached charter for this purpose.

FUNDING SOURCE/COST:

The funding source for support of the Task Force would be general fund. Cost is expected to be negligible outside of the District staff that would be involved in working with the Task Force on ongoing analysis, reporting, creating recommendations, etc.

FUTURE FISCAL IMPACT:

The purpose of the Task Force would be a continuous process of improvement with respect to cost, control, efficiencies and performance. Therefore, future fiscal impact will be relative to the requirements of revenue. Over time this will serve to moderate the extent of new resources required, at least a cost avoidance type scenario. The reason for a cost avoidance minimal disposition is that as the size of the District grows, the demands on the District grow and the cost of operating grows, cost avoidance many times is ultimately the maximum return on this type of work.

Charleston County School District Task Force to Focus on Operational Efficiencies and Cost Control Charter

<u>Establishment of the Task Force to Focus on Operational Efficiencies and Cost Control</u>: The Charleston County School District School Board of Trustees officially authorized the creation of the Task Force to Focus on Operational Efficiencies and Cost Control on May 26, 2015.

Representation

The Task Force shall be comprised of at least five (5) and no more than nine (9) volunteer members of our community.

An advertisement will be issued seeking interested candidates to fill the membership of this Task Force.

Qualifications

The Task Force members should possess knowledge of one or more of the following areas: finance, budget, lean organizational structure and process, accounting, human resources, Six Sigma, etc.

Interested parties will submit a letter of interest providing information on their background and the reason for wanting to participate in the Task Force.

<u>Term</u>

The term of service for continuity purposes is one (1) year, renewal by joint agreement between committee members and the Superintendent's designee (Chief of Finance, Operations and Capital Programs).

<u>Structure</u>

The Task Force will have an initial organizational meeting at which time they will select a chair, vice chair and secretary.

Function

The Task Force will be a body that will analyze relevant data, create ideas for cost control efficiency and performance improvement. They will make recommendations to the appropriate committee and Board by way of designated staff by March 1 of the fiscal year but more frequently and timely as appropriate recommendations surface.

<u>Meetings</u>

At the organization meeting, the Task Force will establish meeting dates for the year.

Selection

Staff will recommend a slate of potential committee members to the Board for approval at a CCSD Board of Trustees Business Meeting.

SUBJECT:

Request for Proposal (RFP) for Conducting a Staffing Study in FY 2016

BACKGROUND:

The Charleston County School District as a public education entity has the majority of its costs driven by people. The cost of salary and benefits exceeds 71 cents of every dollar expended by the District's general fund to support the goals, strategies, and purpose of Charleston County School District. Since it is the area of greatest expenditure, it also is the area of greatest opportunity with respect to cost control efficiencies and setting the necessary capacity to carry out and execute the actions required to meet and/or exceed the goals of Charleston County School District, a District of excellence.

DISCUSSION:

The Charleston County School District recently conducted and has partially implemented the salary study ensuring that there was a clear awareness of the appropriate level of compensation for staff across the District. In addition, the process enabled the District to simplify its salary structures and pay schedules while ensuring that all staff were appropriately identified with respect to grade, category, etc.

By conducting this study, even though full implementation has not yet been achieved, we are at least at 95% of market as a result of what was implemented for current year 2015. In addition to the impact upon salary schedules and other related outcomes as mentioned previously, this work allows us to continue to monitor competitiveness with respect to compensation versus the market and therefore ensure that proposals coming to the Board regarding compensation are aligned accordingly.

Having now completed a salary study, it is my recommendation that the District conduct a staffing study. There are many opinions with respect to expending public funds. There is certainly a multitude/plethora of opinions how to do it best and appropriately. I am strongly suggesting that the Charleston County School District Board of Trustees approve the process to create, distribute and accept request for proposals ultimately identifying a third party through which a District wide staffing study would be conducted. This staffing study would cover staff funded by all funding sources not just the General fund albeit the General Fund is the largest source of funding for staff, salaries, and benefits.

Given the authority to move forward, we would set up a procurement strategy that would be able to deliver upon evaluation of request for proposals and time to identify an appropriate service provider early in the next school year. The intent would be to give the service provide the maximum time possible to have work done, reviewed, and recommendations received by the Task Force, Audit & Finance, and the Board as a whole. The timing should be designed such that the decisions that would be

forthcoming from these recommendations could be implemented as soon as received and/or no later than budget development for fiscal 2017.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Charleston County School District Board of Trustees hereby approves the approval to create, distribute, and accept a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a Staffing Study to be started and completed in FY 2016.

FUNDING SOURCE/COST:

General Operating Fund Potential Cost – TBD Estimated at \$100,000

FUTURE FISCAL IMPACT:

Future fiscal impact could result in both efficiencies, reallocation of funds, and/or expansion of funding needs with respect to areas identified to be under capacity with respect to staffing versus expected outcomes and performance levels.

SUBJECT:

Establishment of a Board Approved School Community Task Force

BACKGROUND:

Charleston County School District has always built a master plan which looks forward in 5-year increments as we consider the necessary infrastructure to deliver state of the art, academic educational experiences for our communities' young men and women. As we were preparing the language for the referendum that was held in November 2014, a new master plan was generated and submitted to and reviewed by our County Board of Trustees beginning the in the spring of 2014. That master plan continued to evolve until such time as the final referendum language was adopted and subsequently approved overwhelmingly by Charleston County stakeholders.

In preparation for the finalized referendum language regarding the high school in District 4 (North Charleston), a meeting was held on June 6, 2014. A list of attendees is attached. The purpose of this meeting was to examine options with respect to high school organizational structure which then led to the modification and final adoption of a plan leading ultimately to the final referendum language.

DISCUSSION:

Upon successful passage of the referendum in 2014, staff had begun planning and developing execution strategies for the projects as listed in the referendum as groups called "waves". In the referendum language are two centers for advanced studies: one for North Charleston and one for the City of Charleston in West Ashley. In creating the execution plan for the Center for Advanced Studies for North Charleston, it was important to ensure that we were once again aligned behind the plan that led to the referendum language which included the construction of a Center for Advanced Studies in North Charleston.

A meeting of a few of the stakeholders from the June meeting was held on April 30, 2015. A PowerPoint that was presented at that time is attached. The general consensus from those who did attend is that the organizational structure that had been proposed and would support the referendum action was favored. However, there is a need to roll this out on a broader scale. The District will establish, with approval of the Board, a School Community Task Force structure where multiple schools and school structures may be considered for reorganization and improvements. At this time, it makes sense that we should establish a School Community Task Force regarding the redesign of high school operations in North Charleston. Therefore, this recommendation is asking the Board to formally establish such a School Community Task Force. Once the Task Force is established, we will submit to the Board for approval additional representatives that are not specifically identified by School Community Task Force outline but may be approved by the County Board.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Charleston County School District Board of Trustees hereby approves the establishment of a School Community Task Force regarding organizational structure for High Schools in District 4 in conjunction with the planned construction of the North Charleston District 4 Center for Advanced Studies (C)

FUNDING SOURCE/COST:

No additional funding required.

FUTURE FISCAL IMPACT:

The future fiscal impact will be dependent upon the final recommendations coming ultimately to the Superintendent and finally to the Board. The cost for construction modifications with respect to the Center for Advanced Studies and modifications to other existing spaces is part of the overall plan and will be borne by the budget already established in the 2014 referendum for Phase IV 2016-2022 Capital Building Program.

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WHERE DO NORTH CHARLESTON STUDENT GO TO HIGH SCHOOL?



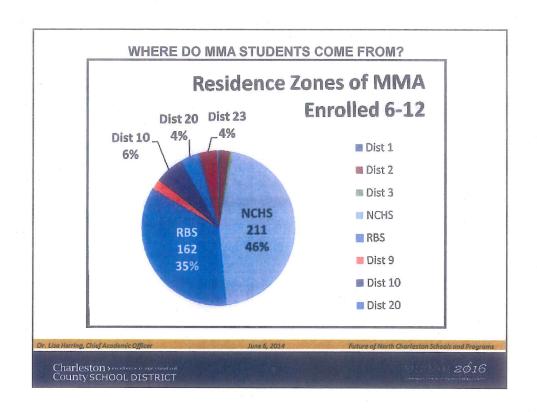


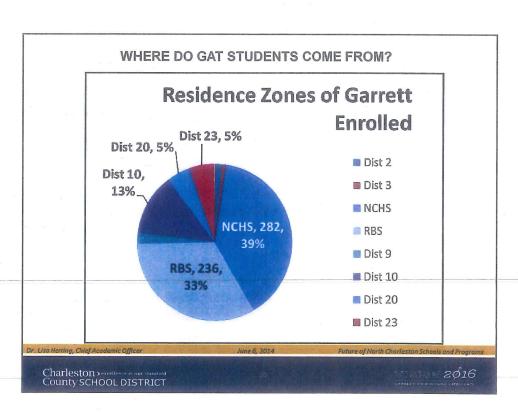

Establishing Committee Dates for Audit & Finance, Strategic Education and Policy & Personnel Committees for 2015-2016

BACKGROUND:

The Charleston County School District Board of Trustees has established Board Committee structure intended to process and support necessary actions required for the on-going work of the Charleston County School District.

DISCUSSION:

Through 2015-2016, the three (3) committees that are listed in the "Subject" had established a separate pattern of meetings in conjunction with the order and dates of Charleston County School District Board business meetings. Typically, Board business meetings have been held the second and fourth Mondays of every month. Occasionally, the Board of Trustees will establish a modification in this order due to calendar challenges and/or special needs for action.

It is recommended that the Charleston County School District Board of Trustees establish meeting dates that allow for sequential meetings of the three committees on the same date on a monthly basis. Note: This would require twelve meeting dates. This allows further discussion around the potential of a committee "of the whole" and the ability to reduce the number of business meetings to one while using the committee of the whole as the workshop type meeting to be held every month. Subsequently, there is always the ability to add additional business meetings as necessary.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Charleston County School District Board of Trustees hereby approves the Establishment of Board Committee Dates for 2015-2016.
