John Cobb to Lead Administrator Mentoring and Coaching at CCSD

Charleston, SC — Charleston County School District (CCSD) announces that John E. Cobb has been appointed the Executive Director of Administrator Mentoring and Coaching for the district. Mr. Cobb currently serves as the Executive Director of Elementary Learning on special assignment as Principal at Edmund A. Burns Elementary. In his new position starting July 1, he will mentor and coach at Burns Elementary and other assigned schools in the district.

Cobb's career as a school administrator includes serving as Assistant Principal at Colleton County's Forest Circle Middle School and CCSD's Springfield Elementary School, and as Principal at Northside Elementary School and Drayton Hall Elementary School. After 12 years at Drayton Hall, he served as the Interim Director of the Elementary Learning Community during the 2015-2016 school year; he was hired permanently as the Executive Director of the Elementary Learning Community in May 2016.

Cobb holds a Bachelor of Science in Music Education from Herbert Lehman University in New York, and a master's in Elementary Education Administration and an Ed.S. in Education Leadership from The Citadel.
