#### TRANSITION PLAN FOR LINCOLN MIDDLE SCHOOL

Transitions are difficult especially for students, staff and the community who have significant loyalty to their current school. Charleston County School District Board of *Trustees* and Staff understand and appreciate the challenges students, parents and staff will face, and they will provide the leadership and support to make this transition.

Lincoln's history is a proud one and one that is worthy of celebration and respect. As we close this chapter, we move forward with a commitment to ensure every Lincoln Middle School student has an opportunity for a positive and successful experience with this transition.

With the closure of Lincoln Middle-High School, the middle school students of District One will transition to a new location. Although transitions can be difficult, the ability of our middle school students to return to a more nurturing K-8 environment such as St. James Santee is a wonderful opportunity. In addition, providing the current 6th and 7th grade students at Lincoln an option of attend either Cario Middle or Laing Middle, where many of their peers currently attend, would provide a choice option for these students who are now facing a change so late in the school year.

The major factor in educating middle school students does not rest so much on the location but, more importantly, is to ensure that the facility has the space and the curricular choices to provide our adolescent students with a broad spectrum of educational experiences where they can explore and prepare for the vast opportunities waiting for them when they graduate high school and enter post-secondary education, or the workforce. It is with this premise that we submit the following points and options:

Allow current 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> grade students at Lincoln the option of transferring to Cario or Laing Middle school. These students may be provided bus transportation to Cario and/or Laing. Currently there are:

- Four (4) 6<sup>th</sup> grade students and three (3) 7<sup>th</sup> grade students zoned for Lincoln who attend Thomas Cario Middle School.
- Three (3) 6<sup>th</sup> grade students and three (3) 7<sup>th</sup> grade students zoned for Lincoln who attend Laing Middle School.

This will give the current middle school students attending Lincoln broader school choice options and expanded opportunities during this transition. In addition, this would allow SJS to

systematically develop their middle school program adding one year at a time in order to be at full capacity when the new Lincoln HS opens.

#### **OPTION 1: TRANSITION TO ST. JAMES SANTEE**

#### STUDENT ISSUES/ACTION-

#### Building and Space

Provide a separate wing or hallway in the building that can be used as the middle school wing.

Provide a tour of St. James Santee to current middle school faculty at Lincoln.

#### Curricular Offerings

Provide a  $6^{th}$  grade summer academy at St. James Santee so that students who are rising  $6^{th}$  graders can experience a shift from elementary to middle school.

Ensure that St. James Santee campus offers varied opportunities in related and fine arts. (Physical Education, Music, Art, Engineering).

Provide opportunities to take HS credit courses through Edgenuity Online coursework that would include: Spanish 1, Algebra 1, Technology and English 1.

#### Academic Interventions

Academic Saturday School option for all four core content areas and daily intervention periods in all core classes for any student needing assistance.

Acceleration classes to help scaffold the students' learning.

Stronger instructional delivery model to raise the level of rigor and deeper learning.

#### Social Emotional

A strong PBIS program to help develop a strong climate, relationships and high expectations.

#### **TEACHER/STAFFING ISSUES/ACTION**

- Verification of 6-8 Teacher Endorsement. Opportunity for current Lincoln Middle School Teachers to transfer to St. James Santee for their middle grades program.
- Teacher uncertainty over placement

  To be determined by HR and communicated rapidly.
- Input to St. James Santee regarding individual student needs from Lincoln Middle School teachers.

Teams of teachers and guidance from both schools to set up student data review examining MAP, ACT Aspire, PASS, student grades, and SC Ready test scores

- Losing interventionists due to budget cuts *To be determined.*
- In placement, culture of school important.

  Individual needs, gifts, skills, interests and proximity need to be considered.

Historically, enrollment has always been low; however, it has declined this year to a total of 67 students in grades CD -5. This size school is more expensive to operate and this year the per pupil cost is \$18,965.72. During the meetings held to discuss allocation formulas, the allocation committee recommended that small schools be closed, both as a cost-saving measure and a way to offer a greater array of educational offerings and support. **Background:** On February 2<sup>nd</sup>, the D23 Constituent Board discussed the possibility of closing Jane Edwards during their constituent board meeting. By request of the D23 board chair, a follow up discussion was held with the Superintendent, staff, and CCSD Board Chair Bohn-Coats on March 15, 2016. A summary of that meeting is attached and was shared with the D23 board on April 5. With the diminishing student population, only four regular classroom teachers will be allocated to Jane Edwards next year, most likely one for kindergarten, two for combined grades 1-3, and one for combined grades 4-5. We believe moving the students from Jane Edwards to Minnie Hughes will provide a more instructionally sound environment and open Discussion: student access to a wider array of supports and services. However, because closing this school will necessitate transporting a few very young children for a significant time and distance, we recommend deferring the closing of Jane Edwards for one year (until June, 2017) in order to give the school district and community leaders time to investigate other options for providing educational opportunities on Edisto Island. Requests made by constituent board representatives; response by district administration.

Request	Response
1. That the District 23 Advanced Studies program remain at E.B. Ellington for the 2016-17 school year. The District 23 board understands that CC Blaney will remain closed and requests that CC Blaney be reopened when the number of students in the Advanced Studies program reaches 200.	1. The district plans to expand the District 23 Advanced Studies program to include eligible Grade 4 students next year. The program at Ellington will operate as a D23 choice option. Transportation will be provided for D23 students. – At this point in time, the district is not in a position to commit to reopening CC Blaney but is open to further consideration of that possibility if the program reaches 200 students under the current eligibility criteria.
2. Because of declining enrollment, Jane Edwards should be transferred to Minnie Hughes Elementary. The D23 board request is to: a) maintain Jane Edwards as a separate school within Minnie Hughes, and b) to ensure Jane Edwards students neither board buses earlier nor arrive home later in the day.	2. The district agrees that Jane Edwards students would be much better served at Minnie Hughes. The district agrees to purchase an additional bus, equipped with air conditioning and wifi so that some instruction could possible be provided during the time students are in transit. Further, the district will study carefully pick-up and return times to do everything possible to ensure a reasonable school day length
Also, the current Jane Edwards building will not be disposed of	District staff will recommend to the Charleston County Board of

for at least two years.	Trustees that the current Jane Edwards school building remain district property for at least two years.
4. The middle school students (Grades 6-8) at Baptist Hill should move to R.D. Schroder Middle School.	4. The district cannot recommend the movement of Baptist Hill Middle School students for the coming year. We are willing to carefully monitor enrollment trends, program needs and space, and disciplinary data at the combined middle-high school campus. Mrs. Coats said she would be willing to take this matter under consideration at the appropriate time.
5. That D23 withdraw their Montessori program from D10 and begin to explore a Montessori program within D23. This will give D23 a Montessori program without losing students or teachers to D10.	5. The district agrees to look into the feasibility of establishing a Montessori program to serve D23 schools if parental/student interest and support is sufficient.
6. Expand technical/career opportunities to students at Baptist Hill High School.	6. The district is examining career/technical offerings for students in all four zones of the district and has pledged to the D23 board to improve career and technical opportunities for Baptist Hill students.
